

#### Cherry Blossom Festival by Lillian Dukes, Purple Belt

Japan hosts a beautiful festival called Hanami, also known as the Cherry Blossom Festival, to celebrate the arrival of spring. Have you ever wondered about the origin of this fascinating festival?

During the Nara period (710-794), farmers prayed under cherry trees. The farmers believed that the cherry blossoms signified a full harvest. These prayers slowly changed into a festival and then during the Edo period (1603-1868), common citizens started having banquets under the trees. Today, the festival is a vibrant display of music, food, and beauty that attracts visitors from all over the world.

The cherry blossom season occurs from the end of March into the month of May. Festivals are held all over the country of Japan. At the cherry blossom festival, they have picnics with brewed alcohol made from fermented rice. Some common foods at these picnics are rice balls, called onigiri, grilled meat, fish, and vegetables. Sweet treats are also very common such as tamagoyaki (a rolled egg omelet dipped in soy sauce and sugar). Another dessert is made from sweet red bean pastes called anko and mochi. Mochi is a delicious sticky rice cake that is under the category of wagashi (traditional Japanese sweets). They also have tea ceremonies which often feature tea wares. Cultural experiences include live performances and cultural displays, and at the end, paper lanterns are commonly lit when the sun goes down and they shine down on the cherry blossom trees.

The best places to go for hanami are Ueno Park, Shinjuku Gyoen Park, Hirosaki Castle, Kawazu, Sumida Park, and the Meguro River.


The cherry blossom festival is filled with picnics, beauty, and an amazing long history. It started with farmers praying under the trees to bless their harvest and it evolved into a celebration held nationwide from March to May. These festivals include picnics with a lot of food, cultural displays, live entertainment, and paper lanterns at night. Go and see the cherry blossom festival and all its amazing sights!

### Matsubayashi-Ryu History

After the Japanese surrendered to the United States in World War II, Grand Master Shoshin Nagamine was sent to a village called Iraha where he did odd jobs for the wounded at the back of the hospital. Nagamine eventually returned to the police department where he worked as a policeman before the war. In 1951 he was promoted to Police Superintendent and was appointed head of the Motobu Police Station where he trained young policemen in Judo for the purpose of participating in an All-Okinawan Judo Tournament. He incorporated karate as well into their training and his team ended up winning this tournament! Pleased with the result of his efforts as the head of the Motobu Police Station, he resigned from the post to pursue his main purpose of building a karate dojo.

Nagamine opened his first dojo in 1942 where it was later destroyed during the war. He founded Matsubayashi-Ryu in 1947 and opened a temporary dojo in 1948. He finally opened his permanent dojo in Naha in 1953 and called it Matsubayashi-Ryu Kododan Karate and Ancient Martial Arts Studies. The name Matsubayashi-Ryu was in part chosen in honor of two of the most important teaching masters, Sensei Sokon Matsumura of Shuri and Sensei Kosaku Matsumura of Tomari.
