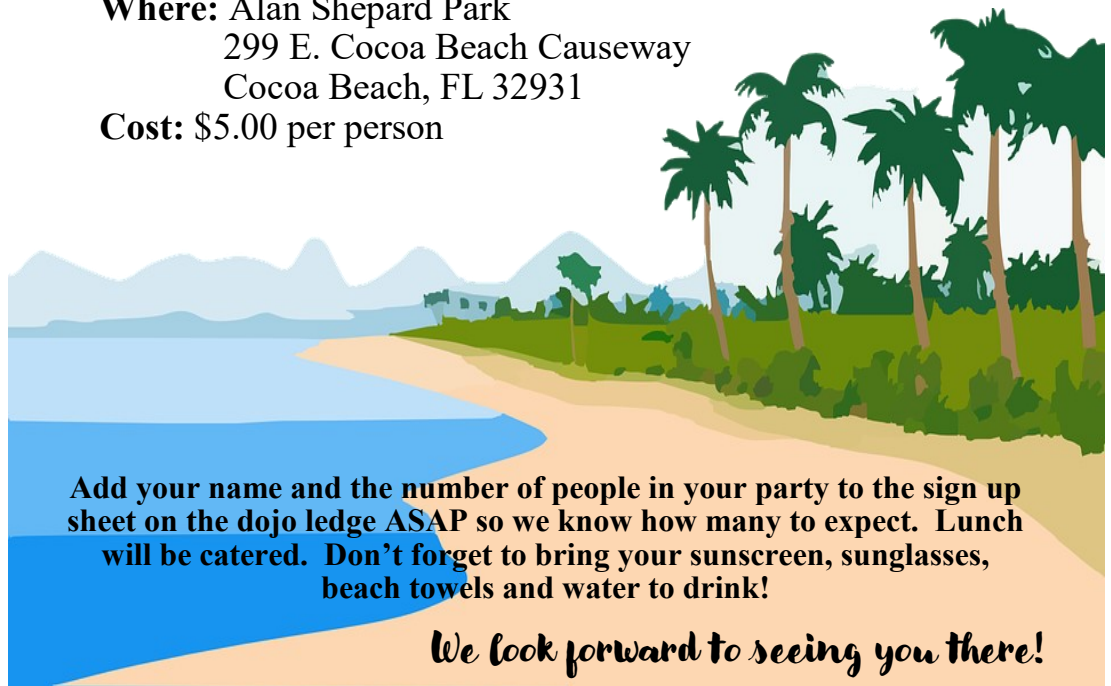

Taiko Drums by Javier Herrero, 1st kyu

The origin of music is unknown; however, one could argue that it has been part of human life since the beginning. Similarly, drumming has been an integral part of music and culture throughout the world. Taiko drums are part of Japanese culture and have been incorporated in their music, theater, religious ceremonies, and even warfare. Their origin, influence and evolution have shaped modern Japanese society.

The word “Taiko” means drum in Japanese. Taiko has mythological origins in Japanese folklore, nevertheless, history records indicate that they were used in ancient Japan over 2,000 years ago. It is believed that the Taiko drum appeared in Japan sometime during the 5th and 6th century from nearby Asian countries, India China and Korea. Taiko drumming has served various purposes from communication to religious ceremonies to more modern uses such as being incorporated in social movements.

With the modernization of Japan, Taiko has in many ways become a relic. However, some suggest that Japan has experienced a cultural renaissance of sorts and the native art of Taiko drumming has become popular once more. Presently, all school children in Japan know Taiko and events now commonly feature Taiko drummers.

Taiko was brought to the United States by Japanese immigrants in the early 20th century as a way to preserve their culture. Over time, the Japanese were forced to lose their identity, especially during WWII when the Japanese were placed in internment camps. After the war, they had to try hard to assimilate into American culture. During this time, both Japanese language and culture, including Taiko were forgotten. During the Civil Rights Movement, it has been said that some Japanese-Americans had a desire to revive their identity and Taiko drumming was reborn. At the end of the 1960's two groups in San Francisco acted as the pioneers for taiko music in the United States.

Present day, there are groups throughout the nation who perform and continue the deep traditions of Taiko drumming. The Orlando Taiko Dojo is a music group in Orlando that actively performs at events all throughout Central Florida. Their drumming techniques and skills were featured by people of all ages during our dojo's 35th year Christmas Demo celebration in 2021.

As Japanese culture becomes more popular throughout the globe, Taiko also grows in popularity. Taiko has even been seen in some Cirque de Soleil performances. It seems that the cultural renaissance of Japan continues to spread and young people all over the world are learning the ancient form of Taiko. Taiko is known as the heartbeat of Japan and its music continues to evolve with this new generation of drummers.

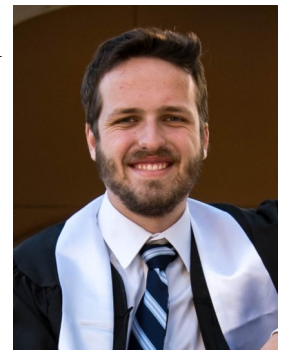
