Traditional Japanese Music by Ocean Warren, 1st Kyu

Japan has various cultural differences in comparison to the rest of the countries in the world that are very interesting to learn about and experience. Some of these may include its food, traditions, and even the mannerisms of citizens, however one piece of Japanese culture that's especially fascinating is the music— specifically traditional music. In Japan, traditional music is referred to as 'hōgaku,' which can be described as music from the 17th to mid-19th century. Traditional Japanese music is made up of the folk, court, instrumental, and theatrical subgenres.

Japanese folk music, min'yō, is a style of traditional Japanese music from the 6th-8th centuries that was inspired by Chinese culture. Folk songs were often about religion, love, and old legends, and they were created by the sounds of traditional Japanese instruments, like the shakuhachi and the shamisen. They were performed in Shinto rituals that often involved singing and dancing. Every region of Japan had its own series of folk songs, as each area had different legends and stories to sing about.

Folk music became the backbone to a new subgenre: court music. Court music, also known as gagaku, is a form of Japanese classical music that was performed in the Kyoto Imperial court. It's a more elegant form of folk music that's meant for exclusively the upper classes. Court music was a type of luxury that only aristocrats and royals had the ability of listening to, so it became something of great respect to the regular citizens.

Traditional Japanese instrumental music was pretty straight forward. It had a very meditative style to it and was meant to have ritualistic dances to it. The instruments that were used to produce this type of music were kotos, shakuhachis, shamisens, hichirikis, komabues, shos, and biwas.

The final subgenre of traditional Japanese music is theatrical. There are two types of Japanese theater music: Noh and Kabuki. Noh theater music is generational and incorporates masks and costumes into its performers wardrobes. It's still performed today in the same ways that it once was. Kabuki theater music is typically performed by males only, and they all wear intricate makeup and ceremonial clothing. Kabuki consists of more dancing and singing than Noh, but they're both effectively performed with the purpose of entertaining the audience.
