

Shorin-Ryu and Goju-Ryu by Dawn Moncrief, 1st Kyu

Inspired by the touching story of how Shoshin Nagamine adopted Chojun Miyagi's Gekisai Dai Ichi (Goju's first kata) to be Fukyugata Ni (Matsubayashi's second kata)—and because I'm more generally curious based on my own background in Goju-ryu—I've taken this opportunity to explore the special relationship between Goju-ryu and Shorin-ryu (Matsubayashi, in particular).

Shorin-ryu (forest* style) and Goju-ryu (hard-soft style) are two of four traditional Okinawan karate styles that share some core philosophies and priorities around respect, discipline, humility, and using martial arts as a means of personal and community betterment. Some of the differences can be traced to them being developed in different regions of Okinawa. Though small, the island of Okinawa has different terrains in the north and south that makes some types of stances and techniques more beneficial than others.

In broad terms, Shorin-ryu developed in the north (Shuri) uses fast, more linear techniques and higher, more natural stances that allow for quicker, more agile movements that prioritize precision. Goju-ryu, by contrast, developed in the south (Naha) uses circular movements (hands and feet) with more focus on breathing, power and close-range applications. While less directly practical, these are good for strength and conditioning. The circular movements of Goju stances can function to destabilize the stances of opponents. The circular hand movements allow for redirection into grappling or jiu jitsu style applications.

In both systems, like many other martial arts, techniques evolve as students advance. Many advanced interpretations have multiple strikes and function as take-downs. What is taught as a block might also be a strike with multiple interpretations depending on context. They share the core focus on empty hand techniques and basic kicks (just performed a bit differently). They also share the Okinawan kobudo (weapons) system (bo, nunchaku, sais, and tonfas). The weapons are traditional farming tools because weapons like the sword were banned in 1470. Just one of the ways in which Okinawa is unique with its long and complicated history with internal and external military invasions and occupations.
